Die Fortbildung wurde durch die Ärztekammer Westfalen-Lippe mit insgesamt **12 Fortbildungspunkten** (Kategorie: B) zertifiziert.

The **best presentation** of a participant below the age of 35 will receive the Johann Nepomuk Czermak Award (see information box).

Czermak prize of the year 2016 for the best Czech presentation is the participation in the International Tympanoplasty course at the Department of Ear, Nose and Throat, Head and Neck Surgery, University Hospital of Cologne combined with a subsequent job shadowing in the ENT Department for one week.

The best German presentation is rewarded with the participation in endoscopic sinus course at the university hospital Motol, Prague.



During this year's congress, and for the first time, the prize will be named after the co-developer of the laryngoscopy, Johann Nepomuk Czermak. The name Czermak is like no other connected to the German, Czech and European ENT. Johann Nepomuk Czermak (1828-1873) was born in Prague as the son of a well-known physician. He studied medicine at the University of Vienna, Breslau and Würzburg (1849). Afterwards, he was an assistant at the Institute of Physiology in Prague and in 1855 became Professor of Zoology at the University of Graz. Subsequently, he was appointed as the chair of the newly established Department of Physiology in Krakow. He left only 2 semesters later to move back to Vienna in fall of 1857. In summer of 1858 a position became available at the Department of Physiology in Budapest and Czermak was summoned to be the chairman. He established a private laboratory in Prague with a lecture hall and was concurrently a professor at the University of Jena. On March 27th 1858 Czermak reported on the laryngoscope ("Ueber den Kehlkopfspiegel") in the Vienna Medical Weekly. He demonstrated it at the meeting of the Department of Physiology and Pathology on April 9th 1858. He went on extensive travels to Germany, France, Holland, England, Scotland and Ireland to introduce the method of laryngoscopy, leaving enthusiastic young doctors who adopted the new specialty. Arriving by train

Undoubtedly, the most convenient way to Hamm is by rail.


Today, **the train station of “Hamm Westf.”** is a hub for international and national fast trains and an important juncture point in the railroad network between east and west as well as north and south. As this, Hamm is well connected to the nearby Münsterland, Sauerland and the Ruhr district.

The recently redesigned Willy-Brandt-Platz (right in front of the train station) with its architecturally interesting bus station has become a symbol of the restructuring of the inner city.

Arriving by car

Hamm is centrally located nearby the “Kamener Kreuz” (crossing of the highways A1 and A2). So if you are arriving by car, from Hamm you can reach in less than one hour the Münsterland, Sauerland or one of the vibrant cities of the Ruhr district. The **A2 (E34)** and **A1 (E37)** have several exits leading to the city of Hamm and the congress venue. If you are arriving via the A2 take the **exit “Hamm-Uentrop”** or **“Hamm”**. If you take the A1 to get to the congress, choose the **exit “Hamm-Bockum/Werne”** or **“Hamm/Bergkamen”**.

The Country Road B63 leads from Hamm in the direction of a very interesting historic city named Münster.



Arriving by plane

The proximity to the three regional airports **Dortmund, Münster** and **Paderborn** makes Hamm also easily accessible by plane.

The **Airport Dortmund – Wickede** is located in the east of the Ruhr district and can be reached from Hamm within half an hour by car or train. A simple terminal, short ways and layover times as well as 41 destinations in 13 countries make the airport a gateway to Europe. More information at www.flughafen-dortmund.de .

The **Airports Münster/Osnabrück** and **Paderborn/Lippstadt** can be reached exclusively by car. They offer an extensive range of destinations in about 15 countries, scheduled and charter flights. The Paderborn airport provides free parking for long-term parking. More information at www.flughafen-paderborn-lippstadt.de and at www.flughafen-fmo.de .

The nearest international airport is **Düsseldorf airport**, which terminal is directly connected by train to the train station of Hamm (journey time: approximately one hour). More information at www.dus.com .

Hamm itself features an inner-city sport airport with a flight school.
